ICPRA Chairman's Welcome

Kia ora All,

This will be my last Christmas message as Chairman of ICPRA as I will be not be standing for reelection for New Zealand Police Association President in October 2016 when my term expires.

One of the weaknesses of a Federation like ICPRA is that retirement from the local affiliate organisation means that the individual leaves the International body as well, thus taking their experience, knowledge and contacts with them. While this is a constraint, it does demonstrate the need for the ICPRA Executive in particular to maintain close contact, albeit mostly electronically, to ensure good continuity when an individual leaves the organisation. This has been successfully achieved in the past and I am confident will be the case in 2016.

ICPRA has had a successful year, among other things having been invited to address the Police Federation of England and Wales Conference to coincide with the Executive meeting held in London in May.

PFEW, like most similar organisations, faces strong political headwinds as successful public service staff representative associations and unions around the world, including Police Associations come under attack from centre right governments.

ICPRA plays an important role as an information base and also providing a forum where the ideas and experiences of each affiliate can be shared. The strategies being employed in attempts to marginalise Police Representative Associations are conceived and shared across borders at various forums and it is extremely important that organisations representing rank and file police officers do the same. ICPRA provides such a forum.

The visit to the ILO by myself and the Secretary Calum Steele reinforced that there are international bodies who exist to safeguard the rights of workers, including Police, and that ICPRA must maintain contact with and facilitate access to such bodies.

The focus of ICPRA in the short term will be the bi-annual conference to be held in Malaga, Spain in April. The conference will be hosted by Eurocop and will coincide with a Eurocop meeting to be held at the same venue.

Planning is well advanced, and we expect so highly pertinent and interesting topics will be traversed.

On the back of all Police Officers worldwide's minds is the ever present and elevated terrorist threat posed by those who see attacks on Police Officers as the way to highlight their cause and increase disruption.

This is another topic which will be addressed at the Malaga conference as week seek means to ensure our members are as safe as possible while protecting the public.

On behalf on the ICPRA Executive, I wish everyone sharing this ENews a happy and safe festive season.

I thank all those who have worked to assist ICPRA continue to build its significance as an international voice of Police Officers, at a time when such voices are being diminished by governments intent on silencing them.
